"The Peace That Passes All Understanding... and The Storm Passing Over Us!"

Have you ever known someone who just seemed unshakeable? A very present help in times of trouble? Someone who was filled with a calm that clearly didn't come from this world?

I ask, because our times are so turbulent, they might be compared to a raging storm at sea. In the midst of a storm, we all need a safe harbor where we can find shelter. We all need a place, or a presence, where we can feel secure, protected, and find peace while all around us the storm rages.

The greater the storm, the greater our need for such shelter. And friends, we have happened into the storm of the century, stronger even than the double hurricanes that took aim at the gulf coast last month! Jakob Topper of the Baptist News Global observes insightfully, that we now face:

"... a pandemic, a hyper-partisan culture, LGBTQ and BLM movements, and an upcoming election ..."

And we United Methodists can add to this list a question of possible church schism in a few years, not to mention the restrictions to in-person worship and our changing Communion to a drive-thru event.

Had you told me when I was first ordained in 1990, that in-person worship would be interrupted for 5 months, had you predicted I would live through the perfect (pastoral and societal) storm in 2020, I would not have believed you! Who ever imagined a pandemic back then, except in the pages of a fictional paperback novel or on the silver screen? Would that it had remained so!

For us alive right now, these are the hardest times we have ever lived through as a society. My honest desire many days is to find a time machine and travel forward, safely beyond this pandemic! But that is only wishful thinking. The Christian discipline required by our hard times is not one of escape, but of intentional retreat, in the best sense of that word. Not a military retreat but a religious one, a disengaging from the things we cannot control, to the nurture of our spirit in the presence of the One who can calm it, which Christ can.

People who find peace in a storm practice sheltering. Intentional, purposeful. I will admit to you my consumption of the news on cable and internet has dropped in frequency. I spend more time than before in prayer, and in care of self and care of others. Incarnate actions to tend

my soul and the souls of others. Like Christian mystics and monastics throughout history, the modern Christian can find strength for the journey by withdrawing for a time from the chaos of the world and spending some time, listening in the guiet for the Lord who stills the storm.

As we do that, Mr. Topper has some advice for us: *Remember the church is human and fallible; we love the church in spite of her imperfections.

*The pastor is a shepherd, not THE shepherd. Not everyone will ever agree with him/her on every issue. This is not a requirement of pastoring or being a faithful church member.

*Be devoted to prayer now more than ever before. Let the spirit fill

*Find safe harbor from the storm in the shelter of our congregation. Often things look different once the storm has passed. And in the midst of a storm, the precious kind of fellowship St. Luke's has within its walls and through phone and computer is a comfort and a strength to one's soul.

These are thoughts for the journey which I hope will be a help to you. Remember, I am always available by phone or, if you request, for a socially distanced visit!

This staff is amazing and we are committed to providing a safe learning environment in which we will continue to nurture and help our students grow. We will be following all guidelines provided by Virginia Department of Social Services, such as masks for teachers; social distancing; small group sizes; increased hand washing/sanitation; temp checks upon arrival: minimizing number of adults in building by having outside drop-off and pick- up; and overall increased disinfecting. I am confident we will open safely because of the awesome team here at St. Luke's! This includes Pastor Lisa, the teachers, the preschool board, administrative council, and of course, Shirley, Margaret, and Scottie! How can you not succeed with this talented group working together? We look forward to having the little ones fill the halls once again, even if it looks a little different this year!

Gim'me That Ole Time Religion!

We have a tentative date for some old fashioned, OUTDOOR worship.

Our Healthy Church Taskforce isn't yet recommending indoor worship, but it is unanimous in feeling outdoor worship, beneath a hopefully sunny blue sky, on Sunday evenings, just might be a good way to get reacquainted with the blessing and privilege of in-person worship and socially distant fellowship.

Assuming our proposal is approved by our Superintendent, we will gather for Sunday evening vespers at 5 pm beginning September 13th. We will continue these informal outdoor vesper services on a weekly basis as long as weather permits. *

(We will continue our Sunday morning live stream preaching service and add the in-person vesper service!)

If approved, here are some rules that must guide us:

- Stay home if you are sick.
- Take your temperature before you come. It must be under 100.4 degrees F.
- Bring your own chair(s)/picnic blanket (families can sit as a group).
- Observe social distance, from the time you park your car to the time you leave.
- Wear a mask; bring your own hand sanitizer.
- No singing but you can hum!
- 1 soloist is permitted.
- Bathrooms will be open but their use is discour aged.
- Expect to answer basic health acknowledgment questions.

If all is approved, expect a call from church the week before. I hope it happens because I miss the joy of greeting each of you and joining our hearts and souls in praise. Pray that we are able to begin worship again outdoors, in addition to our Sunday morning live stream preaching service!

In case of rain, service will be cancelled.

(**Please note:** Vesper service will not be held on Communion Sundays.)

September 6th Communion

In-person and Online Consecration, with Drive-Thru Distribution at St. Luke's UMC

Dear Brothers and Sisters,

As we get ready to celebrate the sacrament after a four-month wait, here is some explanation of our three-part* worship service scheduled for September 6th.

For the first part of worship, at 11am, many will gather online and those involved in leading worship will gather in the sanctuary on September 6th. All, whether in-person or online, will speak the bolded parts of our liturgy and share in the consecration of the elements.

With the consecration of the bread and the juice accomplished, the 11 am worship service will conclude with an invitation to "Come to the Table of the Lord."

The distribution will be the second part of worship. It will take place in the upper parking lot, after the conclusion of our online service, from noon until 1:30 pm. I hope all of you who share in our 11 am worship, whether online or in person, will join us to receive communion!

Those of you sharing in the service from home will get in your cars and drive-up to the church carport, the first station, to receive the individually pre-packaged, sealed elements while in your car.

Directional signs will guide you on how to approach the carport from the street entrance furthest from Hull Street, and the elements will be offered to you from 6 feet away, using a basket with a long arm.

I will say, "The body of Christ" and "the blood of Christ" as you partake in your car, and then offer

a prayer.


After receiving communion, if you wish, you may stop at the second station and leave your offering, once again using a basket with a long arm.

A third MISSION STOP* has been added as we are collecting boxes of cereal for the Belmont Food Pantry. We hope you will be able to participate in this endeavor.

With this drive-thru communion, there is no need for anyone to get out of their vehicle or to be nearer than 6 feet to one another. If you wish to park and "meet and greet" you can park in the lower lot, one space away from other vehicles, after communing.

I hope receiving Communion and seeing others again, even if from cars in the church parking lot, will be a blessing. This is another continuing step toward getting back to normal. We know there will be more along the way. May we draw nearer to God with each step we take.
